LIONS AND KINGS AND ENGLAND



The three lions attributed to William I and his successors including his great grandson Henry II. The earliest surviving representation of a shield, displaying three lions is that on the Seal of Richard I (1189–1199), son of Henry II perhaps representing Richard I's principal three positions as King of the England, Duke of Normandy and Duke of Aquitaine.




Paige Hurley (Alais)

John Kenny (Henry)

HENRY II

Henry was born in France in 1133. Although Henry was King of England, his first language was French, as were most of his lands. He spoke only French and Latin fluently, although he had some understanding of English. Married Eleanor of Aquitaine in 1152. Their marriage lasted for 35 years until his death in 1189.

At only 21 years of age, he was crowned King of England at Westminster Abbey. Henry II ruled from 1154 to 1189 for 35 years (1154-1189) until his death at age 56 of natural causes. He is buried at Fontevrault Abbey in France. Great grandson of William the Conqueror, First Norman King of England (National Portrait Gallery of London (public domain))




Grace Main (Eleanor)




Reiner Silberhorn (Set Designer)

It's Christmas,1183 with drama and comedy afoot. The Plantagenet family is getting together to fight over a kingdom and a beautiful teen-age paramour. As Queen Eleanor says, "Every family has its ups and downs", and this royal family is no exception. King Henry retorts "It's going to be a jungle of a day: if I start growling now, I'll never last." Eleanor and Henry's three juvenile sons are vying and scheming for the crown, willing to do anything to get it, whilst a likewise young King of France skulks around the castle in order stirring the pot of their discontent. A Christmas helping of wit, bristling humor, intrigue and dungeons.

THE PLAY AND PLAYWRIGHT


When James Goldman (1927-1998) wrote The Lion in Winter in 1966, it was not a hit initially. The original Broadway stage production, at the Ambassador Theatre debuted in New York on March 1966, and ran for 92 performances. The cast included Rosemary Harris as Eleanor of Aquitaine (she won a Tony Award for her portrayal), Robert Preston as Henry II (best known for his role in The Music Man), and a young Christopher Walken as King Philip of France. In 1968, the play was adapted and made into a movie starring Katherin Hepburn and Peter O'Toole. The movie also starred Anthony Hopkins as Richard and the future James Bond – Timothy Dalton as King Philip. The movie won 3 Oscars for Best Actress (Hepburn's 3 rd Oscar), Best adapted screenplay by Goldman himself and Best Original Score. The play continues to be performed all over the world.


Christmas Courts were times of great celebration from December 25 to
January 6, with feasts, masquerades and much politicking. Nobles invited to a Christmas court
really couldn't (and wouldn't want to) refuse. Henry let Eleanor out of prison on at least a
couple occasions. The second time came in late 1184. Henry made all his children join him in
Westminster and brought Eleanor out to join them, hoping she'd support his plans for their
inheritances. (She refused.) This is the Christmas court that inspired in part the events of The
Lion in Winter.



During the time of Henry II, the High Middle Ages (c 1000-1300) in Europe saw a rapid expansion in population which brought about political and social changes. Both Henry and Eleanor highlight the fact that Henry is 50 years old.

At one point Henry exclaims, "I'm the oldest man I know! I've got a decade on the Pope!" Statistically, medieval life spans were short due to high maternal, infant, and child mortality. The average life expectancy in Henry II era was around 35 years. A male who survived to adulthood and didn't go into battle had a good chance of living past age 50. Henry II died at the age of 56.





The Château de Chinon is located on the north bank of the river <u>Vienne</u> in <u>Chinon</u>, central France. Founded in the 10th century, Henry II took over the castle in 1156. Since 1840, the castle has been recognised as a historical monument with restoration occurring from 2003-2010 has become a major tourist attraction.

Aquitaine is a region in southwestern France, bordered on the west by the Atlantic Ocean and on the south by the Pyrenees, a mountain range on the border with Spain. During the 12th century the Aquitaine was one of the wealthiest and most powerful states within France.

Vexin a region in northern France south of Rouen, along the Seine and Oise rivers, which was a border area between the kingdoms of Normandy (Henry's) and France (Philip's). In 1077 William the Conqueror, the first Norman king of England, lost his part of the Vexin to the play's Philip's great-grandfather. Philip's father Louis made the Vexin part of his daughter's dowry when betrothed to Henry's son. Paris is in the southwestern part of the Vexin. "The Vexin is a little county but it's vital to me." (Henry, act one)

Born in 1157, he was known as Richard the Lionheart for his bravery and military leadership during the Crusades. After Henry II death, Richard was crowned King of England ruled for 10 years (1189–1199). Richard married but had no children.

GEOFFREY

One of the middle son of Henry and Eleanor, Geoffrey was born one year after Richard in 1158. He died in 1186 during an accident in a jousting tournament. Geoffrey was married and had several children.

JOHN

The youngest child of Henry and Eleanor, born In 1166. He eventually became King of England after Richard's death. He ruled for 17 years from 1199-1216. He signed the Magna Carta and he is still popular in culture in the Robin Hood stories. John married twice and had several children including Henry III, King of England and Joan Queen of Scotland.

ROSAMUND
Rosamund de Clifford was the daughter of a Norman knight, Sir Walter de Clifford, who had an estate on the English border with Wales. Very little is known about was publicly acknowledged around 1174. It was said she was the love of Henry's life.


